## INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE AUTHORS

The *Medical Journal of the Hospital General de Mexico* is the official organ of the Medical Society of the Hospital General de Mexico. The journal publishes original articles, case reports, reviews and update issues; medical arbitration cases, history notes, issues on medical education, short communications, editorials and news items at the invitation of the society. All articles are peer reviewed by at least 2 reviewers and finally classified as accepted or rejected by the Editorial Board.

The Medical Journal of the Hospital General de Mexico generally follows the indications of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE). The updated version (October 2008) of the Uniform Requirements for manuscripts submitted to biomedical journals is available in www.icmje.org

Ethical issues: Human procedures must comply with the ethical standards of the Helsinki Declaration of 1975 (World Medical Association Declaration of Helsinki) Ethical Principles for Medical Research involving human subjects. JAMA 2000, 284:3043-5. Also, with the agreements given by the Ministry of Health, published on January 26, 1982 and the Rules for Ethics and Research from the institution where the study originated.

Animal studies should follow similar guidelines (Institute of Laboratory Animal Resources, National Research Council. Guide for the care and use of laboratory animals. Washington, DC. National Academy Press, 1996).

Regarding the confidentiality of data, you should inform on how the anonymous status of the participants and the confidentiality of their information were protected.

Conflict of interest: In order to avoid conflicts with double publications, if any material of the paper, except the abstract, has been published in other media or has been submitted for publication to another journal, it is the responsibility of the authors to declare it, and send copies of the manuscripts, reporting the relationship between them to The Editor.

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### Characteristics of the work submitted for publication:

- **I. Original article:** It may originate from basic or clinical research and should have the following characteristics:
- a) Title: It should transmit the findings of the study. Add a short title for the inner pages. It is important to mention the type of study (randomized, etc.)
- b) Structured abstract: It should include title, back-ground, objective, material and methods, results and conclusions, written in Spanish and English, with no less than three and no more than five keywords (with MeSH use). Word count: From 100 to 300 (Original article).
- c) Introduction: Describes the studies that are the background of this paper and that allow the understanding of its objectives; these are mentioned at the end of the introduction. Objectives, hypothesis and approaches are not written separately.
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- g) References: They should follow the specifications described later. It is advisable to include references from Mexican authors.
- f) Pages are limited to a maximum of 10 and figures to 7.
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- d) Presentation of the clinical case(s): Include the clinical description, laboratory and other diagnostic studies. Figures or tables should appear at the end of the document, with footnotes.
- e) Discussion: Include the recent and necessary references to understand the relevance of the clinical case. Discuss why this case or these cases are unique, different or similar to other cases in the literature.
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#### III. Review article:

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- c) Introduction and captions if deemed necessary. You can start with the topic at hand without captions.

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#### IV. Short communications:

This section is for papers of medical, social, bioethical and policy interest, or in relation to one of the research articles. They have no particular format.

#### V. History article:

The author is free to develop a theme of the history of medicine. It should be limited to a maximum 3 pages and 5 pictures.

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At the request of the editor, in the form of a clinical case.

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At the request of the publishers; use an independent format such as in Diagnostic and Treatment Guidelines.

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#### Examples:

Journal article: Stoy N, Mackay GM, Forrest CM, et al. Tryptophan metabolism and oxidative stress with Huntington's disease. N J Neurochem 2005,93:611-623. If more than three authors, cite only the first 3 followed by et al. The abbreviations for journals must adhere to the style of National Library of Medicine, available in: http://www.nlm.nih.gov

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**Book chapter:** Jabs DA. Rheumatic diseases. In: Ryan SJ Retina, Mosby, St Louis M, 1994, 1421-1444. **Book:** Kanski JJ. Uveitis Diagnosis and Treatment. Ed Marban. Spain.p: 40-50.

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
